# FROM THE TOADSTOOL

## • THE CAPE PENINSULA NATIONAL PARK TAKES SHAPE

April 29th 1998 marked the single most significant event in the creation of the CPNP, which is the only National Park contained within a metropolitan area anywhere in the world. Three local authorities have signed over control of over 700 hectares of nature reserve, including Cape Point, Silvermine and Table Mountain, to the new park. This area of 2 900 hectares is uniquely rich in plant species and eco-systems; the Cape Peninsula, 104 kilometers in length, is home to 2285 plant species, of which 174 are on the threatened list.

An agreement between the Parks Board and SAFCOL regarding the future of the Tokai and Cecilia Plantations is now the main priority. We are talking to both parties and continue to emphasise that the Porter Trust area forms an integral part of Tokai's tranquil gateway to the central part of the park.

## SAFCOL "RIGHTSIZING" TO CONCENTRATE ON CORE BUSINESS

We can expect significant changes in the management control structure of the Tokai Plantation which is currently being brought under the control of Grabouw as SAFCOL eliminates layers of management in order to become more cost competitive. We are in close touch with management and are emphasising that these changes must not destroy the excellent co-operative working relationship that we have built up over the past two years.

## • CONCERN ABOUT WILDLIFE & ENVIRONMENT SOCIETY (WESSA)

WESSA has withdrawn from discussions with the new CP National Park management. We, along with other Friends groups such as Newlands Forest, Silvermine and Cape Point, are very concerned that WESSA West Cape management have not been able to develop a networking relationship with the management of the new park. We will increasingly need to work closely with all levels of park management, and are reviewing formal links to WESSA.

## • SAFCOL WEST CAPE REGION

This region has been awarded the international Forest Stewardship Council Certification (FSC). We were interviewed by the auditors of the process (covered in our January newsletter).

#### NETWORKING WITH OTHER FRIENDS GROUPS

Following WESSA's failure to act as a catalyst to develop networking among Friends' groups, we held a very successful get-together/walk and braai with a number of Cape Friends in the Arboretum during February. We have subsequently joined Sivermine and Liesbeek River Friends on walks; we had a very informative tour and braai with Helderberg Friends; attended lectures on bark-stripping for herbal medicine; went on seedling collection walks with Newlands/AMIF; are working on a tree policy for the fringes of the new park with Friends of Constantia open spaces; and plan an overnight trail in Cape Point later this year.

Our mission is "To promote public participation in caring for Tokai Forest". Never has our forest needed our care more than now. Care doesn't necessarily mean getting our hands dirty in hacks, or pulling up alien seedlings. It is much more multi-faceted, as we learned from our visit to the Helderberg Friends who run an Information Centre, Nursery and Education Centre (which together cost hundreds of thousands of rands to develop). We have boundless opportunities to care, and there is an increasing void of management with all the major changes. Caring can provide plenty of fellowship and enjoyment. None of us are experts. We encourage you to get involved: every drop contributes to the wave. WHY DON'T YOU TRY AND FIND A NEW FRIEND TO JOIN AND CARE TOGETHER IN SOME SMALL WAY.

#### **EDUCATION**

• Fadiah Abbas of Levana Primary School, has taken over the Education portfolio.

Networking with Wendy Hitchcock, NBI Kirstenbosch Education Centre, Dr Debbie Hall, WESSA Education, and Sidney Schonegewel of SAFCOL, a series of Workshops are

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currently taking place with teachers from local schools. The workshop on 20<sup>th</sup> April was attended by 20 teachers, and included a walk around the Arboretum to assess its value as an education resource for the new Outcomes Based Education (OBE) syllabus which is currently being phased in. There is a high level of enthusiasm about the potential for students from pre-primary right through to high school. We also have some excellent education resource pamphlets developed in the 1980's, when there was an active extension programme which lapsed because of lack of funding. The next workshop will be held on 6<sup>th</sup> May in the Information centre, and the programme will focus on appropriate teaching aids which the NBI and WESSA are currently developing. We have invited Debbie Atkinson to join our Friends' team to assist in getting this exciting project off the ground.

At the end of last term, Earl Williams of Prince George's Primary School brought 25 pupils up to the Arboretum in the SAFCOL school bus for an energetic morning's environmental hike up the Prinseskasteel riverbed to Elephant's Eye. John Green egged them up the stiff lower slopes with the motto "The way to eat an elephant is one bite at a time!" The walk covered many subjects ranging from Gondwanaland and the earliest forms of trees; early foresters and the introduction of pines, gums and the invasive wattles; our own lovely Afromontane forests; butterflies and pollination; dungbeetles and porcupines; Black Eagles and Dusky Flycatchers. We all agreed that even in an area where pines predominate, there is an amazing diversity of natural interest to stimulate potential ecologists of the future.
